

### Elpis' new information management system

Elpis needs data to plan and manage services to improve the outcomes of those we support. Like many small charities, our information systems have evolved over time in a piecemeal way. We recently employed a software company - Blue Door - to develop a new system to meet our needs.

We now have an integrated database that stores extensive information accessible to staff and to young women if they wish to access their records. A working group of members of Elpis Board, and managers and staff worked with Blue Door to create the right solution for the service. Elpis' Board of Trustees play a significant role in overseeing and supporting the service, and planning for the future. New

members – Kelda McLean and Alan Dunipace – who joined in Autumn 2021 have already started to make their mark.


Kelda has extensive experience in population health, and is taking a particular interest in the development of The Sunflower Project that will provide continuity of care for young women who become pregnant whilst living in Elpis accommodation, supporting them through their pregnancy and after.

Alan Dunipace is a retired solicitor who practiced in Glasgow, and is getting involved in operational and employment aspects of Elpis, inputting his legal knowledge and expertise.

It is great to have both new members on Board, and also thanks to Paul Hannan who left the Board in early 2022 after a year of service as a Trustee, during which he made a particular contribution to organizational governance.

The Sunflower Project – continuing care for young pregnant women

Elpis' developments in the next few years will include enhancing support for young



women who become pregnant. At the moment we cannot accommodate mothers and babies so young women need to move out before they give birth. The Sunflower Project will give expectant mums intensive support and a flat that suits them and their baby.

Continued funding from Agnes M Hunter Trust and Foundation Scotland (Volant Foundation) has helped us support young women with babies who left Elpis, and aided thinking. And thanks also to Dr John McBain who has donated £30k over the past 3 years to Elpis, with £10k of that this year going towards The Sunflower Project. We are now in discussions with Glasgow City Council and Maryhill Housing Association about starting the first phase of the service this summer.
